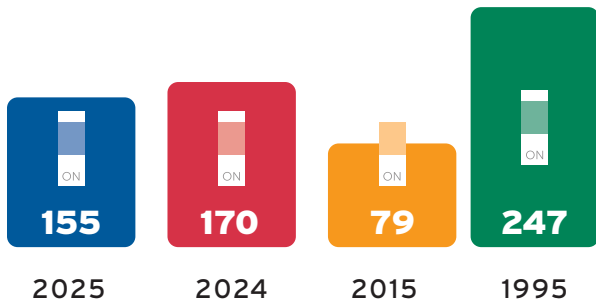

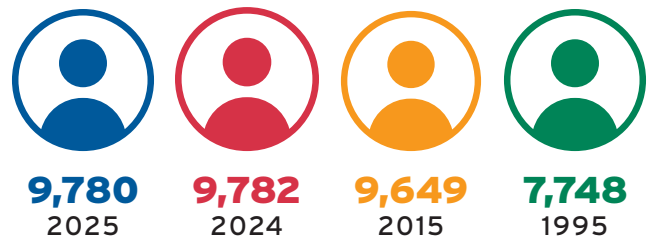
TOTAL NUMBER OF METERS



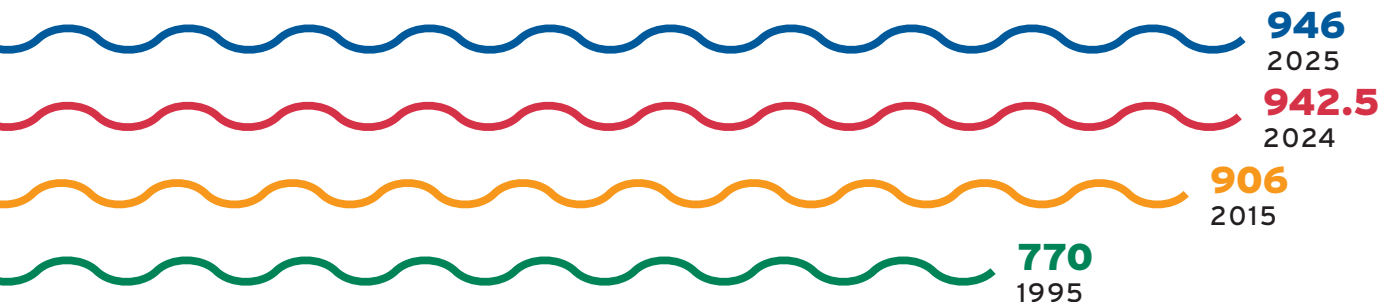
AVERAGE COST PER KWH

Steuben County REMC members, thank you for your sincere welcome to the community. It's a privilege to be part of a strong tradition of service rooted in cooperative values and principles.

Steuben County REMC has been in operation for 89 years, and we will soon be celebrating our 90th anniversary next year. Throughout all these years, our commitment to serving our members has never changed. Our founders established the REMC in accordance with the seven cooperative principles and with the desire to provide our members with affordable, reliable electrical service. This mindset has not changed. We've brought those same principles and values to our members today with the addition of broadband. Bring fast, reliable, and affordable fiber internet to a once-underserved area with the same member services that we all expect from your REMC. Broadband is now fully deployed and available to all our members.

As your cooperative, we stand strong on our values. Through our not-for-profit business model, we focus on offering our members safe, affordable, and reliable electric and broadband services. We stand strong in our commitment to the local communities that we serve. We give back to our community through the seventh cooperative principle — Concern for

Community. One great example is our Operation Round Up program. Over the years, we have given over \$880,000 to local organizations that help make our area a better place to live.

We are proud to be local. When you call the REMC, you're talking with your friends and neighbors in the community. We call this the "cooperative difference" — a member-first approach that shapes everything we do. This is what makes us different, and this is why being a member is a great thing.

Being a cooperative member has benefits. First and foremost, the membership elects the governing board. In alignment with the second cooperative principle — Democratic Member Control — your board of directors is made up of members, just like you. From May 11 through June 11, members will vote for Districts 1, 2, and 9. Our board of directors is responsible for defining and setting the strategic direction for the REMC. This can be particularly challenging, given the ever-changing world we live in today. So cast your votes and know that your governing board is made up of active local members just like you.

We are a non-profit cooperative, owned by the people we serve. This is the fourth cooperative principle

— Autonomy and Independence. That ownership shows up in the decisions we make, the way we invest, and the values we hold. Our goal is not to generate returns for outside investors. It is to provide reliable, affordable electricity and to support the communities we call home.



Level out your electric bill with budget billing

Seasonal weather can make electric bills unpredictable. Hot summers and cold winters often bring higher energy use, which can lead to fluctuating monthly bills. Steuben County REMC’s budget billing program helps members manage those changes by spreading energy costs more evenly throughout the year.

Budget billing works by averaging your electric use over an 11-month period to determine a consistent monthly payment. Instead of large swings in your bill during peak heating or cooling months, this program helps keep your payments more stable and predictable.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

To enroll in the budget billing program:

- Your electric service must have been in your name since June 1, 2025.
- Your account must be paid in full before enrollment.
- You must remain current on your bill during the budget billing period.

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS

Budget billing amounts are based on your previous 12 months’ of electric use. Because energy use can change over time, your monthly budget amount may be recalculated once or twice during

the year to keep the payment aligned with your actual use. Budget participants should watch their Account Summary balance on their monthly bill.

At the beginning of each calendar year, accounts are reviewed and the monthly budget amount may be adjusted. Any remaining credit or debit balance at the end of the budget year is settled during the June billing cycle through a “true-up” adjustment.

ENROLLMENT INFORMATION

Members interested in budget billing should contact the Steuben County REMC office at 260-665-3563 before Friday, May 29. The new budget cycle begins with the July billing (due in August).

Agreement letters are not required. Once you request enrollment, your account will be automatically added to the program. Members may request to be removed from the program at any time. However, if you miss a payment or request removal, you will not be eligible to re-enroll until the following year’s budget cycle.

Budget billing is a simple way to bring stability to your monthly electric bill and make household budgeting easier throughout the year. For more information, contact the Steuben County REMC office or visit us online.

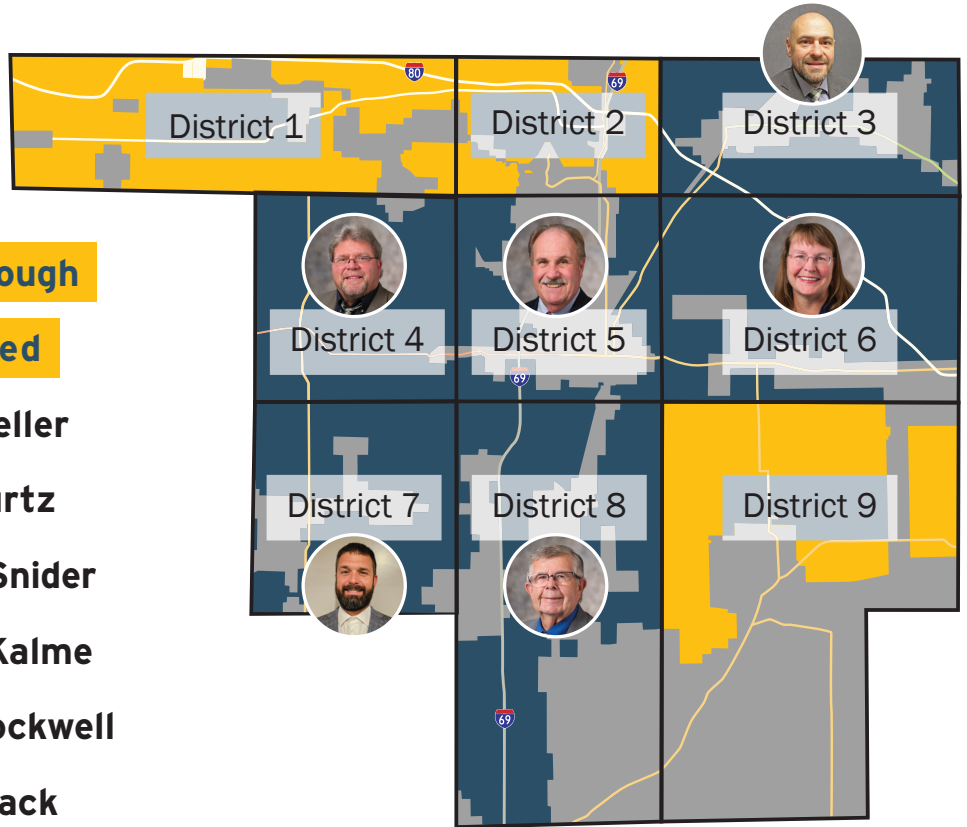

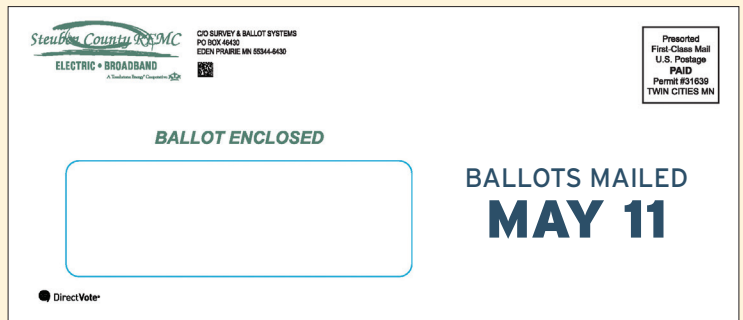

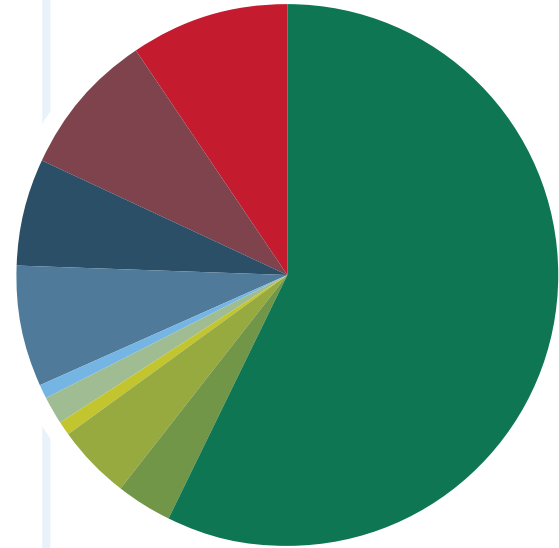

Through the cooperative's Operation Round Up program, \$43,000 was recently awarded to 14 local organizations and community projects, helping support programs that strengthen and improve life throughout Steuben County.

Operation Round Up allows members to voluntarily round their monthly electric bill up to the next dollar. The average donation is about 50 cents per month, or roughly \$6 per year, with a maximum of \$11.88 annually. While the individual amount is small, when thousands of members participate, the impact adds up quickly.

The program is overseen by a volunteer board that reviews applications and distributes funds quarterly to local nonprofit organizations. Since its launch in June 2004, Operation Round Up has provided more than \$880,000 to over 575 community projects across Steuben County.

Today, approximately 70% of Steuben County REMC members participate in the program. Their contributions support nonprofit organizations that enhance the quality of life, promote community development, and provide important services to local residents.

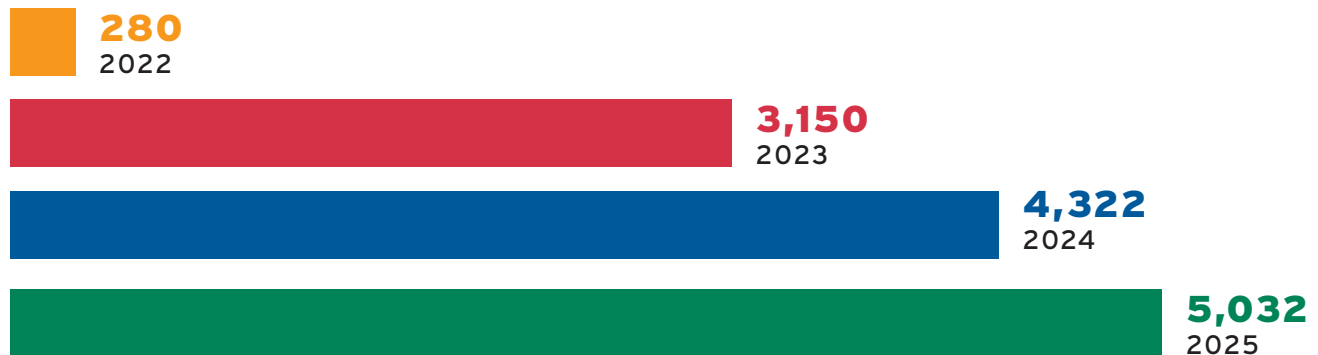
